2.1. Course objectives	The course will provide students with some important data on each prophet, his work, and theological message of each individual prophet. Students will become capable of analysing texts of individual prophets.

Course content broken down in detail by weekly class schedule (syllabus)	<p>The course begins with the prophet as a person of God's trust and his special mission to the people of Israel, contextualised in time and space. The course contents follow a chronological line, starting from prophets of the 9th century until the 2nd century. Each prophet is analysed through:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - The historical context in which he acted - Basic traits of the person of the prophet - The structure of the book of each prophet - An overview of the prophet's theological message, i.e. theme.
